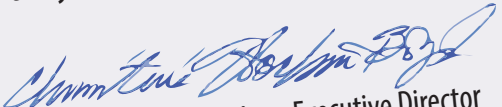


# community lifeline center

Would it surprise you to know that in our community – surrounded as we are by affluence – nearly three times as many of our neighbors received help from Community Lifeline Center in 2014 than in 2013? Or, that the number of households asking for help increased 66% from 2013 to 2014? We hear about an improving economy. For many it is, and that's a good thing. But, for the working poor – those who are doing all they can to make it on their own - sometimes the unexpected, the unforeseen, is overwhelming. So the work at Community Lifeline Center continues. Although we provide economic assistance, career counseling, and skills training, often we make a difference with a caring voice, a willingness to listen, and a suggestion on where to turn. Community Lifeline Center provided information or a referral to over 6,000 people last year. Sometimes those in need are asking for just an idea of how they can help themselves. 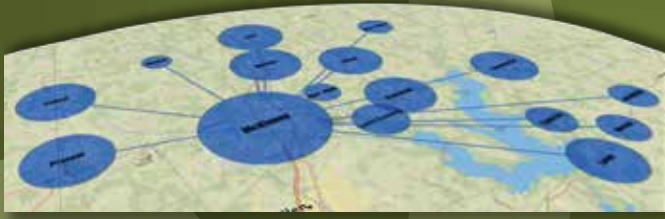

2014 marked 25 years Community Lifeline Center has helped people in crisis regain self-sufficiency, with emergency assistance for housing, utilities, medical expenses and food



CLC not only serves McKinney, but also the north Collin County communities of Altoga, Anna, Blue Ridge, Celina, Copeville, Farmersville, Josephine, Lavon, Lowery Crossing, Melissa, Nevada, New Hope, Princeton, Prosper, Westminster, and Weston

households were provided a total of \$73,303 to keep their utilities turned on



291½ Hours of mental health counseling was provided to 135 CLC clients



Of the single parent households served, 86% were headed by a single mother; 14% by a single father



Provided medical, dental, and prescription assistance worth \$1,726



In 2014, CLC served 12,049 clients - a 158% increase since 2013



59% of CLC clients were female; 41% were male



64% of CLC clients either obtained or improved their employment situation within 90 days of their first contact with CLC



Volunteers contributed 7,696 hours



21,378 lbs of food & 6,145 household/hygiene items were distributed through the Lifeline Market
